Four-time National Champion Katie Uhlaender began the sport of skeleton in 2002, quickly climbing national rank by winning both the National and Junior National Championships in her first season. She dominated the World Cup tour during the 2006-07 season, winning five gold medals and claiming the overall World Cup crown. Uhlaender made the Winter Olympic Team in 2006 and slid to a sixth place finish in Torino. Her father, Ted, played professional baseball for the Cincinnati Red's "Big Red Machine" team in the 1970s. Uhlaender is currently enrolled at Colorado Mountain College as a science major.
