BIOGRAPHY

Steve Holcomb began the sport of bobsledding in 1998, and competed in his ninth season as a bobsledder in 2006-07. Holcomb claimed both the two-man and combined World Cup titles after winning ten medals on the 2006-07 tour, five each in two-man and four-man events. Holcomb was ranked second in overall World Cup standings for four-man. During his first season as a pilot, Holcomb raced in the first half of America's Cup, reaching the podium on all eight tries, with six victories and two runners-up. Holcomb was a fore-runner in the 2002 Salt Lake City Olympic Games and came back to compete in the 2006 Torino Olympic games. Driving both two-man and four-man sleds in Torino, Holcomb finished sixth in the four-man and 14th in the two-man. Holcomb attended the University of Utah and is currently enrolled in the computer science program in the University of Phoenix's online program. Holcomb also served seven years in the Utah National Guard.
